

# QUICK LOOKS AT GREAT BOOKS!

For 7<sup>th</sup> - 12 Graders - Can count as English, Literature, or Elective

**Objective:** To guide students in reading, analyzing, and appreciating six of these great “must read” books while acquainting them with others.

**Content:** Students will read and study the following books in depth:

*A Tale of Two Cities* (Charles Dickens)

*Silas Marner* (George Eliot)

*The Count of Monte Cristo* (Alexandre Dumas)

*To Kill a Mockingbird* (Harper Lee)

*The Old Man & the Sea* (Ernest Hemingway)

*Cyrano de Bergerac* (Edmond Rostand)

- Students will study the lives & times of the authors of the above works.
- Life spiritual & moral lessons are identified & evaluated through these stories.
- Students will learn the importance of allusion, flashback, genre, symbolism, irony, local color, hyperbole, mood, tone, theme, point of view, plot, satire, parody, and other literary terms.

Payment 2: \$168 (Due January 19, 2022)

**Tuition is non-refundable if a student drops after 3 classes.**
